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2021-2022 COVID-19 Accreditation Guidelines ATS Commission on Accrediting (effective June 7, 2021; updated January 31, 2022)

In January 2022, the ATS Board of Commissioners updated its *Fall 2021 COVID-19 Accreditation Guidelines*. These guidelines* allow for three types of accreditation visits in AY 2021-2022: (1) *an online visit* conducted virtually through interactive means (e.g., Zoom) when either the host school or the

visiting committee as a whole has significant health concerns about an onsite visit, including any visits

where local, state/provincial, or national regulations do not permit an onsite visit; (2) *an onsite visit* when

neither the host school nor any member of the visiting committee has health concerns about conducting
an onsite visit; or (3) *a hybrid online/onsite visit* when the host school has no health concerns about an

onsite visit but one or more members of the visiting committee do, in which case the committee

member(s) with the concern will participate virtually. All visits, regardless of type, will be conducted with
appropriate attention to health and safety concerns and to the complexities associated with varying visit

modalities.

Unlike previous versions of these guidelines, schools may no longer request that a visit (or a report) be postponed purely for COVID-related reasons, but may do so for other reasons per <u>Policies and Procedures</u> III.B.1 and VI.A.6. Also, schools that offer any part of a degree online must have, or petition for, distance education approval per <u>Policies and Procedures</u> IV.F.1, though waivers to offer any part of a degree online without distance education approval are still allowed through spring 2022. Like previous versions of these guidelines, comprehensive visits conducted entirely online must host an onsite follow-up visit (by at least one visitor or staff member) when it is reasonable and safe to do so to verify that the school has appropriate physical resources.

Schools with comprehensive visits scheduled in spring 2022 are encouraged to consult with their Commission staff liaison as soon as possible to discuss which type of visit will be conducted. Any onsite visit may be converted by Commission staff either to an online visit or to a hybrid visit at any time prior to the visit, if health-related concerns should surface from the host school, a visiting committee member, or Commission staff.

*NOTE: These 2021-2022 guidelines are consistent with the <u>coronavirus-related guidelines</u> issued by the US Department of Education on December 11, 2020, that extended permission for virtual visits to US schools through June 2021, or for 180 days after the current health crisis is no longer declared a national emergency. That US declaration was still in effect in June 2021, when these guidelines were issued, and in January 2022, when these guidelines were updated. Schools and the Board of Commissioners should document any accreditation-related actions taken under these guidelines.
