The following statements reflect a sample of some of the important information contained in your school profile. There is more to be gleaned from a careful reading of your tables and those of the 2012 - 2013 Profile of Participants.

- > (Table 12) Students were asked to measure their personal growth during seminary. The three top areas in which your graduates felt they were stronger were: "Self-knowledge," "Trust in God," and "Insight into troubles of others."
- > (Table 13) MDiv graduates were asked to indicate their satisfaction with progress in skills related to their future work. The top five areas at your school were: "Ability to think theologically," "Ability to use and interpret Scripture," "Ability to relate social issues to faith," "Knowledge of my own religious tradition," and "Ability to preach well."
- > (Table 16) The percentage of your MDiv students who rated their field education or internship experience important or very important was: 78.5%. (Table 17) For these students the two top effects of field education/internship were: "Better idea of my strengths and weaknesses" and "Improved pastoral skills."
- > (Table 18) How satisfied have you been with a variety of seminary services and academic resources? The top three rated choices of your graduates were: "Quality of teaching," "Class size," and "Helpfulness of administrative/staff support."
- > (Table 15) Graduates cited the following as the three most important influences on their educational experience at your institution: "Faculty," "Interaction with fellow students," and "Biblical studies."
- > (Table 19) A list of sixteen statements was presented to graduates to explore their satisfaction with their seminary experience. The three most important sources were: "Faculty were supportive and understanding.", "I have been satisfied with my academic experience here.", and "I have been able to integrate the theology and practice of ministry.".
- > (Table 10) The one statement, more than any other, which indicates the number of hours per week your MDiv students worked this year was: More than 20 hours.
- > (Table 7) Most graduates at your school brought the following educational debt with them: None. The percentage that came with a debt load of \$30,000 or more was: 14.3%.
- > (Table 7) Most graduates at your school incurred the following amount of new educational debt during seminary: None. The percentage that had a debt load of \$30,000 or more at the time of their graduation was: 28.5%.
- > (Table 7) Your graduates most frequently estimated their monthly payment for educational debt as: None. The percentage that had a monthly payment of \$500 or more was: 16.4%.
- > (Table 9) The three most important sources of income for your graduates included: "Scholarship/grant," "Off-campus work," and "Savings."
- > (Table 2) During the course of their studies, the percentage of your graduates who took academic leave for a term or more was: 16.6%. The percentage of your MDiv graduates who began their program in 2009 was: 30.1%.
- > (Table 20) The percentage of your MDiv graduates who anticipated full-time parish ministry was: 40.1%. The next two areas were: "Undecided" and "Hospital or other chaplaincy."
- > (Table 21) The percentage of your other graduates (non MDiv) who anticipated full-time parish ministry was: 21.9%. The next two areas were: "Undecided" and "Other."

CHART 1: Enrollment by Gender and Degree Program







CHART 3: Enrollment by Racial/Ethnic Identity











CHART 4: Age Range, Marital Status, and Gender







CHART 5: Age Range and Racial Identity



CHART 6: Number of Dependents by Gender and Marital Status







CHART 7A: Educational Debt Brought by All Students



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





(1-No importance 2-Little importance 3-Somewhat important 4-Important 5-Very important)







CHART 10: Hours of Work per Week at Paying Jobs



CHART 12: Measure of Personal Growth after Theological Program



CHART 13: Level of Satisfaction with Progress in Skills Related to Future Work






CHART 15: Three Most Important Influences on Educational Experience






CHART 16: Importance of Field Education/Internship if Required



CHART 17: Top Two Effects of Field Education/Internship if Required





CHART 18: Level of Satisfaction with School's Services and Academic Resources



CHART 19: Overall Experience during Theological Program



CHART 20: Position Expected after Graduation for MDiv Students



CHART 21: Position Expected after Graduation for All Other Students (Non MDiv)



